



CHS Medical Service Commitment for Transfer of Breastmilk

Riverside Correctional Health Services recognizes the importance of breastmilk for babies in giving them a healthy start in life. This requires commitment and work by both the breastfeeding mom and the designated caregivers of the infant or toddler.

Instructions

The commitment and consistency of the caregivers to pick up the breastmilk **a minimum of every 3 days or on agreed upon schedule.**

Mother must identify the names of the persons who will to pick up the breastmilk

When the breastmilk is picked up, the person must be prepared to show picture ID to the Custody Officer.

Designated caregiver to go to the window in the Jail lobby and identify self and state that they have come to pick up the breastmilk of the name and booking number of the mother.

Milk will be brought to the lobby and “the Breastmilk release log” will be filled out by the nurse and designated person

Designated caregiver must bring a cooler bag with ice pack to transport the milk. Milk must be stored per CDC guidelines. See handout
